

Fact Sheet X-RAY

What is an X-ray?

An x-ray is a fast, painless test that uses radiation to take pictures inside the body.

What is involved?

Before the test, tell your doctor and the imaging staff if you are pregnant or think you might be pregnant.

The X-ray staff will ask you to stand, sit or lie down depending on which part of the body is being X-rayed.

Once you are ready, the x-ray staff will go behind a screen to start the X-ray machine.

The whole test usually takes 15 minutes.

What happens after the test?

A radiologist (a specialist doctor) looks the images and sends the results to your referring doctor.

Are there any risks?

The X-ray uses a small amount of radiation.

Radiation used at very low levels creates the X-ray images.

Radiation exposure at high levels has a small risk of causing cancer.

Your risk of getting cancer while having an X-ray is very low or non-existent.
